WHERE CAN I REGISTER TO VOTE?

You may register at any of the following locations:

WHERE DO I VOTE?

Each voter must vote in the polling place designated to serve the precinct in which they reside. This location is indicated on your voter ID card. If you prefer to vote by absentee ballot contact the Township Clerk.

Drop Box

Summer property tax statements are issued **July 1** and payable through **Sept. 14, 2022** without penalty.

Pay Your Bill:

- Online at shelbytwp.org/treasurer or phone, toll free, by calling 844-701-5086. Pay with credit, debit or (online only) echeck. Applicable fees will be applied.
- Drop box at the 24 Mile Road exit and North Entrance of the municipal building. Drop boxes are closed at midnight on the due date.
- Mail a check to 52700 Van Dyke Ave., Shelby Twp., MI 48316. All payments must be in or postmarked by Sept. 14, 2022.
- Fifth Third Bank branches in Shelby Township. Visit 53.com for locations and hours. To pay your bill at Fifth Third Bank, you must present the entire bill that you received in the mail and pay in full with cash or check.
- Pay in person at the municipal offices with cash, check, credit, or debit (applicable fees for credit or debit).

WHEN ARE ELECTION DAY POLLS OPEN?

Polls open at 7 a.m. and remain open until 8 p.m. Anyone in line at 8 p.m. will be allowed to vote

DO I NEED TO SHOW A VOTER ID CARD TO VOTE?

No, voter ID cards list districts and polling locations. Voters should bring a photo ID on Election Day. Voters not in possession of a photo ID must sign an affidavit stating they are not in possession of an ID.

HOW DO I OBTAIN AN ABSENTEE BALLOT?

Absentee ballot applications must be made in writing.

Applications are available from the Township Clerk
approximately six weeks before an election or at
michigan.gov/vote.

HOW DO I VOTE ABSENTEE?

Registered voters may request an absentee ballot by submitting a completed application to the Township Clerk via mail, fax, email or in-person drop-off. The Township Clerk will mail a ballot to applicants promptly. Voted ballots sealed in AV return envelopes with the voter's signature in the required section must be received by the Township Clerk no later than 8 p.m. on Election Day.

Join Shelby Township Clerk Stanley Grot's team as an election worker



To serve as an election worker, you must be a U.S. citizen and a registered voter, and anyone interested in working as an election worker is welcome. This exciting opportunity is perfect for students looking for a first-hand view of democracy in action. Election workers

are compensated for their time working on Election Day.

As the general contractor for the construction of the new Shelby Township Library finishes its work, the Shelby Township Library is closed as the staff moves to the new library and readies for the grand opening 1-4 p.m. on June 25.

The new library increases the current facility's footprint at 51680 Van Dyke Ave. from 12,400 square feet to 26,400 square feet and offers many more amenities for the township. The grand opening will be an open house to allow patrons and residents to tour the new facility.

While the COVID-19 pandemic delayed the new Shelby Township Library's opening, the project finished within its \$11.7 million budget. The facility is the township's first standalone library.

"I never expected to be managing a library building project, but it has been a fascinating and challenging labor of love for the past three and a half years," Library Director Katie Ester said. "I have been lucky enough to work with a talented group of designers, architects, construction professionals, engineers, technology professionals, skilled tradespeople and artists to bring the new Shelby Township Library to life."

"This library is filled with interesting spaces, contemplative nooks, exciting features and beautiful finishes. It is my honor to lead this devoted team of library staff into the newest chapter of our Library history. Opening the doors of the new Library ushers in an important legacy to Shelby Township, one in which our Trustees, Library Advisory Commission, library staff, volunteers and our entire community can take great pride."

The new Shelby Township Library features a

children's area, community event spaces, a teen room, a technology lab, individual study rooms, a children's storytime and programming space, a reading lounge and additional space for materials.

"We're very excited about all of the new amenities our library will have to enhance service for our residents," Township Supervisor Rick Stathakis said. "We've always had the best staff in Macomb County, and now we have a building that allows them to shine."

The new library will have unique features courtesy of private donors. Highlighted by its floor-to-ceiling fireplace, Joseph and Karen Gale furnished and funded the reading lounge. In addition, Carol McLaughlin donated an 18'x7' Pewabic pottery mural.

A 30-foot tall interactive tree sculpture in the children's room is courtesy of the Joan Walen Fund. A one-of-a-kind "magic book" was donated to the children's room by the Friends of the Library. The Utica-Shelby Township Rotary and Macomb Charity Connect donated an interactive Everbrite wall in the teen area.

Thanks to the Friends of the Shelby Township Library donor wall program, individuals, families or businesses can support the Friends of the Shelby Township Library and commemorate a name on a hand-painted 5"x3" glass plaque. Each unique plaque will be part of a custom art installation in the new library entrance.

Important Flood Information

FLOOD HAZARD AREAS — Portions of Shelby Township are encumbered by the 100-year floodplain. The areas most susceptible to flooding are along the main and middle branch of the Clinton River. Smaller floodplain areas exist proximate to the Harris, Longstaff, Decker, Dunn and Bannister Drains. Of course, any drain, stream, river or other body of water in the township poses a flooding risk.

Find out if your property is in the regulated 100-year floodplain and additional information on floodway, Historical Flooding and Wetland by calling the Shelby Township Floodplain Management Office at 586-731-5969 or by visiting the Building Department. The township keeps records of elevation certificates for public view. Maps can also be reviewed online at fema.gov or by visiting the Building Department.

FLOOD SAFETY — Here are some things you can do to protect your family and property from flooding.

- Contact your property insurance agent to see if a flood insurance policy would help you. Even if you're not in the mapped floodplain, you may be subject to flooding from local drainage. In either case, flood insurance can be a good investment because most homeowner insurance policies do not cover damage caused by surface water flooding.
- Do not walk or drive through flood water. Currents are deceptive; just six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Do not drive around barriers, as the road or bridge may be washed out.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. If your house is about to be flooded, turn off the power at the service box. Electrical current can travel through water. Electrocution is the second leading cause of death during floods.
- Be alert to gas leaks. Turn off the gas to your house before it floods. If you smell gas, report it to a township official or your gas company. Do not use candles, lanterns or open flames if you smell gas or are unsure if your gas has been shut off.
- Keep children away from the flood waters, ditches, culverts and storm drains. Flood waters can carry unknown items that have dislodged themselves. Culverts may suck smaller people into them rendering them helpless.
- Clean everything that has been wet. Flood water will be contaminated with sewage and other chemicals which pose severe health threats.
- Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their home may seek shelter in yours.
- Do not use gas engines, such as generators, or charcoal fires indoors during power outages. Carbonmonoxide exhaust can pose serious health hazards.

PROPERTY PROTECTION
MEASURES — Talk to us about
protecting your house or business.
There are ways to modify your
building to minimize flood damage.
Where flooding is shallow, measures
such as small flood-walls, regarding
the yard, and flood-proofing the

walls or utilities can be relatively inexpensive. Where flooding is deep, a building may need to be elevated.

Check with the Shelby Township Building Department before you build, alter, regrade or fill on your property. Call 586-731-5969 first. A permit may be needed to ensure that a project is compliant with all regulations. These regulations are designed to protect your property from flood damage and to make sure you do not cause a water problem for your neighbors.

FLOODPLAIN PERMIT REQUIREMENTS — All

development within the 100-year floodplain (including construction of buildings, filling, excavation, fences, etc.) is required to obtain a permit from the Shelby Township Building Department. Other state and local permits may be applicable too. Applications must be made prior to doing any work in a floodplain area. Please contact the Building Department to receive all the information you will need in order to properly develop in the floodplain at 586-731-5969. You may report any unlawful development activities to the above number as well.

SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENT/ **DAMAGE** — For buildings within regulated floodplains, the National Flood Insurance Program requires that, if the cost of improvements to a building or the cost to repair damages (from any cause) exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the building (excluding land value), the entire building must be brought up to current floodplain management standards. Building improvement projects include exterior and interior remodeling, additions, rehabilitation, and repair and reconstruction projects. Please contact the Shelby Township Building Department at 586-731-5969 for further information.

FLOOD INSURANCE — If you do not have flood insurance, talk to your insurance agent. Most homeowner's insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. Flood insurance is only available to participating communities in the National Flood Insurance Program

(NFIP), such as Shelby Township. Our commitment to floodplain management helps to minimize flood hazards and enables us to be a part of the NFIP. Additionally, because Shelby Township participates in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Community Rating System program, flood insurance premiums are discounted.

Be sure to check your policy to ensure you have adequate coverage. Usually these policies cover the building structure, but not the contents. Contents coverage can also be obtained by asking. There is a 30-day waiting period before flood insurance coverage becomes effective. Plan ahead; do not wait until a flood is predicted before purchasing flood insurance.

If you are building within a floodplain, the purchase of flood insurance is mandatory if using a federally regulated/insured bank for a loan.

NATURAL BENEFICIAL & FUNCTIONS — Don't pour oil, grease, pesticides, or other pollutants down storm drains or into the ditches and streams. Our streams and wetlands help moderate flooding and are habitat for fish, frogs, and other species that provide us with recreation or food. Let's protect them and their homes. Floodplains play a valuable role in providing natural and beneficial functions to the area around, and including, Shelby Township. Floodplains that are relatively undisturbed provide a wide range of benefits to both human and natural systems. These benefits provide aesthetic pleasure as well as function to provide active processes such as filtering nutrients. Significant areas in Shelby Township's River Bends and Holland Ponds parks are located within the floodplain associated with the Clinton River. Both enhance waterfowl, fish and other wildlife habitats and provide feeding/ breeding grounds. Lastly, such floodplain areas provide natural erosion control and open space so further flooding damage does not

Mandatory Irrigation Ordinance

Watering your lawn and landscape May I-Oct. I



Operate sprinklers connected to the municipal water system between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m.

- Even-numbered addresses must sprinkle on evennumbered calendar dates.
- Odd-numbered addresses must sprinkle on oddnumbered calendar dates.



Manual watering is only allowed daily after 9 a.m. This practice includes hand watering gardens or potted plants and car washing with a shut-off nozzle.



Irrigate newly seeded or sodded lawns as often as required for 21 days following planting. Do not water 5-9 a.m.
