Shelby Township Unveils Completion of Phase I Improvements

In a testament to its commitment to enhancing community living, Shelby Township proudly unveiled the completion of Phase 1 improvements at Heritage Lake Aug. 24.

The project showcases the township's dedication to providing its residents with elevated recreational spaces.

"Completing the first phase of improvements at Heritage Lake represents a significant achievement in the township's dedication to improving the quality of life for its residents," Shelby Township Clerk Stanley T. Grot said. "This phase installs three new docks to improve lake access and maximize the park's potential.

"One of these docks extends into the lake from the pathway leading to Mae Stecker Park on the lake's western edge. The other docks, strategically positioned near the entrance of Heritage Gardens, activates a previously underutilized area of the park."

In addition to the new docks, the project includes pergolas, a new fountain and improved fencing. Specifically, an expanded 40-foot fishing pier along the lake's edge, near the Heritage Lake Pavilion, is an appealing spot for fishing enthusiasts and leisure seekers.

Additionally, the project encompasses a range of enhancements that focus on the walking path and shoreline restoration. The pergolas along the path add aesthetic charm and shade, while new fencing enhances safety and defines the space. The new fountain, lit after dusk, provides a captivating centerpiece with soothing visuals and a touch of elegance.

"The completion of Heritage Lake Phase 1 exemplifies our community's commitment to creating spaces that capture the essence of Shelby Township," Township Supervisor Rick Stathakis said. "This milestone underscores our shared vision of progress and unity, and I appreciate Clerk Stanley Grot's commitment to making this happen."

The Shelby Township Board approved the project at its June 21, 2022 meeting with a budget of up to \$695,092 using funds from the township's federal American Recovery Plan Act allotment, underscoring the township's resolve to enhance its recreational offerings while preserving the natural charm that defines the area.

"Our community's connection to the outdoors underscores the importance of projects like Heritage Lake Phase 1," Parks, Recreation and Maintenance Director Joe Youngblood said. "This initiative resonates with our shared desire to

In addition to serving as a scenic backdrop,
Heritage Lake is a hub of activity for Shelby
Township residents. From casting lines for fishing
enthusiasts to capturing timeless prom pictures and
wedding ceremonies against its serene backdrop,
Heritage Lake weaves into the fabric of the
community's life with unforgettable events like the
annual Youth Fishing Derby and the spine-tingling
Halloween Spooktacular.

The Board awarded the project's contract to Wing Construction of Shelby Township, which completed the construction on schedule and within budget.

The township also looks toward the future as it prepares for the ribbon-cutting ceremony. The forthcoming Heritage Lake Phase 2, with an estimated budget of \$1,250,000, will elevate the area's allure through a gazebo, lighting enhancements and a rejuvenated walking path.

"This project represents the Board of Trustees' ongoing dedication to improvement and encapsulates Shelby Township's forward-thinking spirit," Grot said. "By fostering a stronger sense of community, we represent a plan and roadmap for an even better and brighter tomorrow."

To honor those who protect the community at home and soldiers that paid the ultimate sacrifice abroad, Shelby Township hosts its Patriot Day Prayer Service at 1:30 p.m. on Sept. 11 at the township's Veterans Memorial.

Veterans Event Coordinator Phil Randazzo, a Vietnam veteran whose honors include two Purple Hearts and two Bronze Stars for valor, and the Shelby Township Police and Fire departments host the event.

The service allows the community to recognize its first responders and pay respects to Mark Barbret, Tarryl Hill, Christopher Kube, D. Alex Knapp, Todd Lambka and Kyle McClain, the six residents who died from injuries sustained while serving in the U.S. military in Iraq and Afghanistan as part of the Global War on Terror.

Officials from the Shelby Township Police Department and Shelby Township Fire Department will lead the Pledge of Allegiance and place a wreath at the township's memorial. The event closes with a brief prayer service.

The township celebrates its Veterans Day Ceremony coordinated by Veterans Event Coodinator Phil Randazzo. The Veterans Day Ceremony will feature patriotic music performances, speeches and a prayer. Nov. 5 at the Veterans Memorial at 52700 Van Dyke Ave.

"The Memorial Day Ceremony is an occasion to remember and honor our fallen soldiers," said Randazzo. "And, on Veterans Day, we celebrate the men and women who served our nation and were blessed enough to make it back home to their families and friends."

Summer Taxes: From Treasurer James Carabelli

The Treasurer's Office issues Summer tax statements on July 1, payable without penalty through Sept. 14, 2023. After Sept. 14, 2023, a 1% late fee will be assessed for the month of September. An additional 1% will be assessed the first of each month thereafter, through the month of Feb. 2024. On March 1, 2024, all unpaid taxes, Summer and Winter, real and personal, are forwarded as "delinquent" to the Macomb County Treasurer for payment, with additional penalties assessed by the Macomb County Treasurer. We do not recommend using online bill pay through your banking institution. However, if this is your preferred payment method, please consult your banking institution before doing so. Please see below for ways to pay your bill:

The Treasurer's Office now offers more ways to pay:

- Online at shelbytwp.org/treasurer. Accepted forms of payment include: Visa, Mastercard, Discover and American Express; PayPal; Google Pay; Apple Pay; and Venmo. A convenience fee will apply for all payments.
- Dropbox at the 24 Mile Road exit and North Entrance of the municipal building.
- Mail a check. All payments must be in or postmarked by Sept. 14.

The River Bends Park canopy has a new tree, but this one is inside the Burgess-Shadbush Nature Center as the center's beloved opossum ambassador, "Lily," now has a state-of-the-art habitat.

The design and construction of the habitat was a joint effort between Dbaker Designs and Eagle Scout candidate Drew Belisle. The aim was to provide Lily with a home that closely resembled her natural habitat, with two dens to choose from, ensuring her comfort and well-being.

"We are thrilled to unveil the new habitat for Lily, our opossum ambassador, at the Burgess-Shadbush Nature Center," Parks, Recreation, and Maintenance Director Joe Youngblood said. "This project exemplifies community collaboration and dedication to our local wildlife."

Belisle, a Scout with Troop 156, passionately took up the challenge as his BSA Eagle Scout Service Project. His design reflected his love for wildlife and desire to impact his community positively. Belisle raised \$1,643 for the project with homemade pastries and bottle drives.

"My biggest takeaways from the project are the importance of time management and communication while working with others," Belisle said. "My biggest struggle while completing the project was balancing it with school and my extracurricular activities, so good communication with my

beneficiary and time management techniques were necessary to ensure that I was continuing to show progress during the planning process."

"This enclosure will provide Lily with a comfortable home and serve as an educational platform for our visitors, allowing them to witness opossums in their natural habitat," Township Supervisor Rick Stathakis said. "The Burgess-Shadbush Nature Center continues to be a haven for wildlife and education, and this addition is another step towards our goal of fostering a connection between nature and our community."

Nature Center Coordinator Elizabeth "Lizzy" Schultz sees the enclosure as an exciting opportunity to challenge preconceived notions about opossums and hopes visitors can develop empathy and respect for all creatures.

"Many of our visitors only see opossums in their backyard, which can be a startling or scary experience," Schultz said. "By seeing Lily in her natural habitat, snacking on fruit or snoozing in her tree house, we hope she will help people see this misunderstood species in a new light."

The Burgess-Shadbush Nature Center is free to visit 10 a.m.-6 p.m., Wednesday-Saturday, and noon-5 p.m. Sunday. The center is closed Monday and Tuesday. For more information call 586-323-2478, email naturecenter@shelbytwp.org or visit shelbytwp.org/nature.



2023 yard waste collection GFL residential customers can recycle yard waste with curbside collection until Dec. 15.

For 2023, yard waste collection ends Dec. 15. Yard waste consists of leaves, 2 inches in diameter cannot be collected by GFL. Dirt, sod, large stumps, lawn cuttings, shrubs and tree trimmings. GFL Environmental residential customers should place yard waste into the designated brown containers, paper biodegradable bags or labeled containers up to 35 gallons in size.

GFL enforces yard waste weight limits. Brush and limbs less than 2 inches in diameter must be in bundles no longer than 4 feet and not exceeding a total of 18 inches in diameter or more than 50 pounds. Branches exceeding

sand, gravel, concrete, rocks, animal feces and dead animals are not considered yard waste.

Yard waste containing plastic containers, potters, mulch bags or other plastic is considered contaminated and will be disposed of in regular trash. Please remove all plastic bags, ties and pieces from yard waste before placing on

Floodplain Information

FLOOD HAZARD AREAS — Portions of Shelby Township are encumbered by the 100-year floodplain. The areas most susceptible to flooding are along the main and middle branch of the Clinton River. Smaller floodplain areas exist proximate to the Harris, Longstaff, Decker, Dunn and Bannister Drains. Of course, any drain, stream, river or other body of water in the township poses a flooding risk.

Find out if your property is in the regulated 100-year floodplain and additional information on floodway, Historical Flooding and Wetland by calling the Shelby Township Floodplain Management Office at 586-731-5969 or by visiting the Building Department. The township keeps records of elevation certificates for public view. Maps can also be reviewed online at **fema.gov** or by visiting the Building Department.

FLOOD SAFETY — Here are some things you can do to protect your family and property from flooding.

- Contact your property insurance agent to see if a flood insurance policy would help you. Even if you're not in the mapped floodplain, you may be subject to flooding from local drainage. In either case, flood insurance can be a good investment because most homeowner insurance policies do not cover damage caused by surface water flooding.
- Do not walk or drive through flood water. Currents are deceptive; just six inches of moving water can knock you off your feet. Do not drive around barriers, as the road or bridge may be washed out.
- Stay away from power lines and electrical wires. If your house is about to be flooded, turn off the power at the service box. Electrical current can travel through water. Electrocution is the second leading cause of death during floods.
- Be alert to gas leaks. Turn off the gas to your house before it floods. If you smell gas, report it to a township official or your gas company. Do not use candles, lanterns or open flames if you smell gas or are unsure if your gas has been shut off.
- Keep children away from the flood waters, ditches, culverts and storm drains. Flood waters can carry unknown items that have dislodged themselves. Culverts may suck smaller people into them rendering them helpless.
- Clean everything that has been wet. Flood water will be contaminated with sewage and other chemicals which pose severe health threats.
- Look out for animals, especially snakes. Small animals that have been flooded out of their home may seek shelter in yours.
- Do not use gas engines, such as generators, or charcoal fires indoors during power outages. Carbonmonoxide exhaust can pose serious health hazards.

PROPERTY PROTECTION MEASURES — Talk to us about protecting your house or business.

There are ways to modify your building to minimize flood damage. Where flooding is shallow, measures such as small flood-walls, regarding the yard, and flood-proofing the walls or utilities can be relatively inexpensive. Where flooding is deep, a building may need to be elevated.

Check with the Shelby Township Building Department before you build, alter, regrade or fill on your property. Call 586-731-5969 first. A permit may be needed to ensure that a project is compliant with all regulations. These regulations are designed to protect your property from flood damage and to make sure you do not cause a water problem for your neighbors.

FLOODPLAIN PERMIT REQUIREMENTS — All

development within the 100-year floodplain (including construction of buildings, filling, excavation, fences, etc.) is required to obtain a permit from the Shelby Township Building Department. Other state and local permits may be applicable too. Applications must be made prior to doing any work in a floodplain area. Please contact the Building Department to receive all the information you will need in order to properly develop in the floodplain at 586-731-5969. You may report any unlawful development activities to the above number as well.

SUBSTANTIAL IMPROVEMENT/ DAMAGE — For buildings within regulated floodplains, the National Flood Insurance Program requires that, if the cost of improvements to a building or the cost to repair damages (from any cause) exceeds 50 percent of the market value of the building (excluding land value), the entire building must be brought up to current floodplain management standards. Building improvement projects include exterior and interior remodeling, rehabilitation, additions, and repair and reconstruction projects. FLOOD INSURANCE — If you do not have flood insurance, talk to your insurance agent. Most homeowner's insurance policies do not cover damage from floods. Flood insurance is only available to participating communities in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP), such as Shelby Township. Our commitment to floodplain management helps to minimize flood hazards and enables us to be a part of the NFIP. Additionally, because Shelby Township participates in the Federal Emergency Management Agency's Community Rating System program, flood insurance premiums are discounted.

Be sure to check your policy to ensure you have adequate coverage. Usually these policies cover the building structure, but not the contents. Contents coverage can also be obtained by asking. There is a 30-day waiting period before flood insurance coverage becomes effective. Plan ahead; do not wait until a flood is predicted before purchasing flood insurance.

If you are building within a floodplain, the purchase of flood insurance is mandatory if using a federally regulated/insured bank for a loan.

NATURAL & BENEFICIAL FUNCTIONS — Don't pour oil, grease, pesticides, or other pollutants down storm drains or into the ditches and streams. Our streams and wetlands help moderate flooding and are habitat for fish, frogs, and other species that provide us with recreation or food. Let's protect them and their homes. Floodplains play a valuable role in providing natural and beneficial functions to the area around, and including, Shelby Township. Floodplains that are relatively undisturbed provide a wide range of benefits to both human and natural systems. These benefits provide aesthetic pleasure as well as function to provide

active processes such as filtering nutrients. Significant areas in Shelby Township's River Bends and Holland Ponds parks are located within the floodplain associated with the Clinton River. Both enhance waterfowl, fish and other wildlife habitats and provide feeding/breeding grounds. Lastly, such floodplain areas provide natural erosion control and open space so further flooding damage does not occur.

DRAINAGE SYSTEM MAINTENANCE — As simple as it may sound, keeping smaller ditches and streams free of debris dramatically improves run-off capacity in low-lying areas and greatly reduces the occurrence blockage that significantly contributes to flooding. It is illegal to dump materials into a required waterway and violators may be fined. If you see someone in the act of dumping in one of our watercourses, please report it to the Shelby Township Building Department at 586-731-5969 or the Macomb County Public Works Offices at 586-469-5327.


